INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL TRIBUNAL FOR THE FORMER YUGOSLAVIA

Dear Mr. MERON, the President of the ICTY,

Let me introduce briefly myself by informing you just about the facts that I was an official opponent to Mr. Slobodan MILOSEVITCH (MILOSEVIC) as a candidate for the President of Serbia 1990 and that I submitted to the Federal Assembly of the F. R. of Yugoslavia the official demand for dismissing him as the President of the F. R. Y. (5th May, 2000).

If there is, Mr. President MERON, of justice, fairness, humanity, appreciation and recognition:

- of elementary human right for a human treatment and an appropriate health care,
- of elementary human right for fair, documented and public judgement,
- of equal peoples' rights,
- of sovereignty, Constitution and freedom of a country and of a people,
- of responsibility of those people who were on the leading state positions to their peoples and countries as well as to the humanity,

then all of them who were:

- kidnapped (delivered forcefully against the domestic state Constitution, e. g. Mr. Slobodan MILOSEVITCH and many others from the Republic of Srpska and the Republic of Serbia)

or

- forced by an anti-constitutionally imposed "law" (mainly in the Republic of Serbia) to go

to the *International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia* in Hague, Holland,
(which was established by the UN Security Council without a UN General Assembly agreement as required by the UN Charter; the institution that in reality ignores those atrocities and crimes that caused the wars and which forced the Serbs to defend themselves; the institution that is concentrated mainly to prosecute Serbs for their consequent defensive reactions),

should be returned without a delay to their countries for the fair documented public judgement by the domestic Supreme or Peoples' Court with guaranteed health care.

In the current situation, the return of Mr. Slobodan MILOSHEVITCH to Belgrade, in view of the below repeated information, becomes urgent.

Please do the justice, Mr. President MERON, according to the Charter of the United Nations and the international law, and inform adequately the General Assembly of the United Nations.

Believing that you are devoted to the human values expressed by the Charter of the United Nations, I kindly ask you, Mr. President MERON, to accept the expressions of my deep appreciation.
